Fascists, King Pay Tribute to Pope in Death

Vittorio Emanuele Telegraphs Condolences to Cardinal Pacelli

Meeting of Cardinals Gets Official Sanction

ROME, Feb. 10. (AP)—The Fascist Grand Council tonight paid homage to Pope Pius XI, whose death today occurred at a critical moment in relations between the Holy See and the Fascist government.

The grand council held its scheduled meeting under Premier Mussolini and adjourned 15 minutes later after offering its condolences.

Its declaration said:

"The Grand Council of Fascism pays reverent homage to the memory of Pope Pius who wished conciliation between the church and the Italian state, the magnificent events which after 60 years of vain attempts settled the Roman questions through the Lateran treaty and established through the concordat relations of collaboration between the church and the state to safeguard the Fascist and Catholic unity of the Italian people."

King Vittorio Emanuele telegraphed Eugenio Cardinal Pacelli, temporary administrator of the church of Rome: "While the Holy Roman church is so sadly stricken by the loss of His Holiness, Pope Pius XI, the Queen and I desire to express to your most reverend eminence our profound and mindful condolences."

The King signed his telegram "your most affectionate cousin, Vittorio Emanuele."

Cardinal Pacelli, who ceased to be papal secretary of state and became Camerlengo—chamberlain of the Holy Roman church—upon the Pope's death, ranks as the monarch's "cousin" as a Knight of Annunziata.

The formal condolences of the Royal family and government were in contrast to the situation at the death of previous Pontiffs during the "prisoner of Vatican" period when relations between the church and state were compelled restraint.

Earlier in the day the official gazette reminded all Italian officials that Italy was bound under the Lateran accord in no wise to interfere with the election of a new Pope.

The government's assurance of full liberty to the conclave recalled the election of 1878 of Leo XIII—the first Pope chosen after the Vatican's loss of temporal power.

At that time Cardinal Manning of England proposed holding the conclave on the Mediterranean island of Malta to avoid contact with the Italian government. The plan was abandoned when the government indicated it might not permit a Pope so elected to enter Rome.

Caskets Are Ordered To House Pope's Body

VATICAN CITY, Feb. 10. (AP)—Vatican workmen were ordered today to make ready three caskets in which the body of Pope Pius will be buried in the grottoes of St. Peter's.

The Pontiff's body will be placed in them in an elaborate funeral service, observing traditions centuries old.

The inner one, in which the body will lie, is to be of cypress wood lined with red satin, having a cross of walnut on the cover.

It will be placed inside a second of lead, a quarter of an inch thick, and weighing nearly 800 pounds.

Both caskets will be placed inside the third, made of polished elm. Its cover will be surmounted by a cross, but will have besides that a skull and cross bones and an inscription and coat of arms.

American Cardinals To Rome to Partic In Selection of New

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.
